May 2018 meeting of the Paramedicine Board of Australia

The Paramedicine Board of Australia (the Board) is established under the Health Practitioner Regulation National Law, as in force in each state and territory (the National Law).

The Board met for the eighth time on Monday 21 May 2018 in Melbourne.

Under the National Registration and Accreditation Scheme (the National Scheme) registration will become mandatory for paramedics from late 2018.

Approval of Registration Standards

The Board noted the approval of the five mandatory and grandparenting registration standards by Health Ministers at the Council of Australian Governments (COAG) Health Council meeting on 13 April and their subsequent publication and effect on 17 May 2018.

To gain and maintain registration as a paramedic, paramedics must demonstrate that they meet the five mandatory registration standards:

- continuing professional development
- criminal history
- English language skills
- professional indemnity insurance arrangements, and
- recency of practice.

Ministers also approved a time-limited grandparenting registration standard, which temporarily provides a path to registration for current paramedics who don't have an approved or accepted qualification, but can demonstrate their competency via other training, qualification and/or experience.

These standards were developed following extensive consultation with the paramedicine profession and the public. They are an important part of how we keep the public safe and set the minimum requirements for competent and safe practice of paramedicine in Australia.

All paramedics must be familiar with the contents of these standards as part of their application for registration under the National Scheme.

Approved qualifications

Under s310 of the Health Practitioner National Law Act, the Board has approved the following CAA accredited programs of study¹ as providing a qualification for the purposes of general registration under the Health Practitioner Regulation Law (the National Law)². An individual who holds one of these qualifications is qualified for general registration in paramedicine.

Interim Codes and Guidelines

The Board agreed to adopt a number of shared and common codes and guidelines documents on an interim basis whilst revised versions of these documents are being developed and consulted upon for final Board approval. The Board agreed to this approach, as it was preferred that the profession have as much advance knowledge and understanding of these issues as possible, rather than wait until closer to participation day³ to be advised of these documents. The interim codes and guidelines adopted by the Board include:

- code of conduct for health practitioners
- guidelines for the advertising of regulated health services
- social media policy, and
- guidelines for mandatory notifications.
